Claudio Grossman is a distinguished Chilean jurist, a graduate of the Law School of the University of Chile in Santiago (1973) and a Doctor in the Science of Law from the University of Amsterdam, the Netherlands (1980). Professor Grossman has had an extensive academic career including teaching in Chile, the Netherlands and the United States, where he presently serves as Dean of American University Washington College of Law and the Raymond Geraldson Scholar for International and Humanitarian Law. He has occupied leadership positions in various international organizations, contributed to development of international law in numerous scientific institutions and countries, and published extensively in the field. Professor Grossman was a member of the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights (IACHR) and twice elected its president. He was also the IACHR's Special Rapporteur on the Rights of Women (1996-2000) and Special Rapporteur on the Rights of Indigenous Populations (2000-2001). In 2003, Professor Grossman was elected member and vice chair of the United Nations Committee against Torture (UN CAT). He has served as chairperson of the UN CAT since 2008, and has been re-elected to that office four times. He also served as the chairperson of the ten United Nations Human Rights Treaty Bodies (2013-2014). Dean Grossman is currently the president of the Inter-American Institute of Human Rights in Costa Rica (since 2014) and was previously a member of the Commission for the Control of Interpol's Files (2005-2011) and of the governing board of the International Association of Law Schools (2008-2012).
